**PASTORAL MESSAGE**

**Dear SSMCians,**

Congratulations to all who completed the BWJ-02 on the four letters Apostle Paul wrote while under house arrest in Rome (AD 60-62). As we systematically read blocks of God's Word, may the Holy Spirit paint a growing and comprehensive picture of God's story, completed, fulfilled and expressed in Jesus Christ and now, in us and through us, His disciples.

For BWJ-03 (July - September), we intentionally selected a cluster of books, called the Minor Prophets, written during the pre-exilic period before Jerusalem was razed to the ground by the Babylonians, and the Jews exiled to foreign nations. The Minor Prophets (or Twelve Prophets), occasionally called the Book of the Twelve, is written between the 8<sup>th</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> centuries BCE. 8 of these prophetic books were written during the pre-exilic period. The other 4, were written after the 70 years of exile.

We will explore Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, and Nahum. We have excluded Habakkuk as it was covered in 2022 by Rev Hwa Yung. The term "Minor Prophets" does not mean they are less important than the "Major Prophets" like Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel and Daniel. They are classified as minor because these are "short" prophetic books. These are the obscure books of the Bible; unfamiliar, seldom read or preached on or taught from. All the more, as God's people, we should seek to understand them to know the full counsel of God.

*Hebrews 1 :1 In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways.*

Indeed God spoke through the prophets in various ways and at various times, be it good or bad times, in prosperity or in disaster. The loud call is to uphold covenantal faithfulness, righteousness, justice and mercy as an individual, society and nation that belongs to God. Additionally, the call to repent comes with the promise of restoration and warnings on the consequences of disobedience. The messages in the Minor Prophets are equally relevant in our time and day to confront and respond rightly to the same spiritual, cultural and social issues confronting us and what it means for us to live right before God and man.

**PASTORAL MESSAGE**

*“The Old is in the New revealed, the New is in the Old concealed”* is a famous quotation by Saint Augustine.

The OT narrative is a foreshadow providing a glimpse or fore-taste of what is to come. The reality is now fulfilled in the NT through Jesus Christ, our Saviour, King and Lord. Jesus came not to abolish but fulfil (every requirement) the Law and the Prophets (Matthew 5:17). On this basis, as we read the Minor Prophets, do observe and reflect on how Jesus Christ fulfilled and expressed the teachings of the Law and Prophets through His life and ministry with grace and truth (John 1:14).

May we follow Him too!

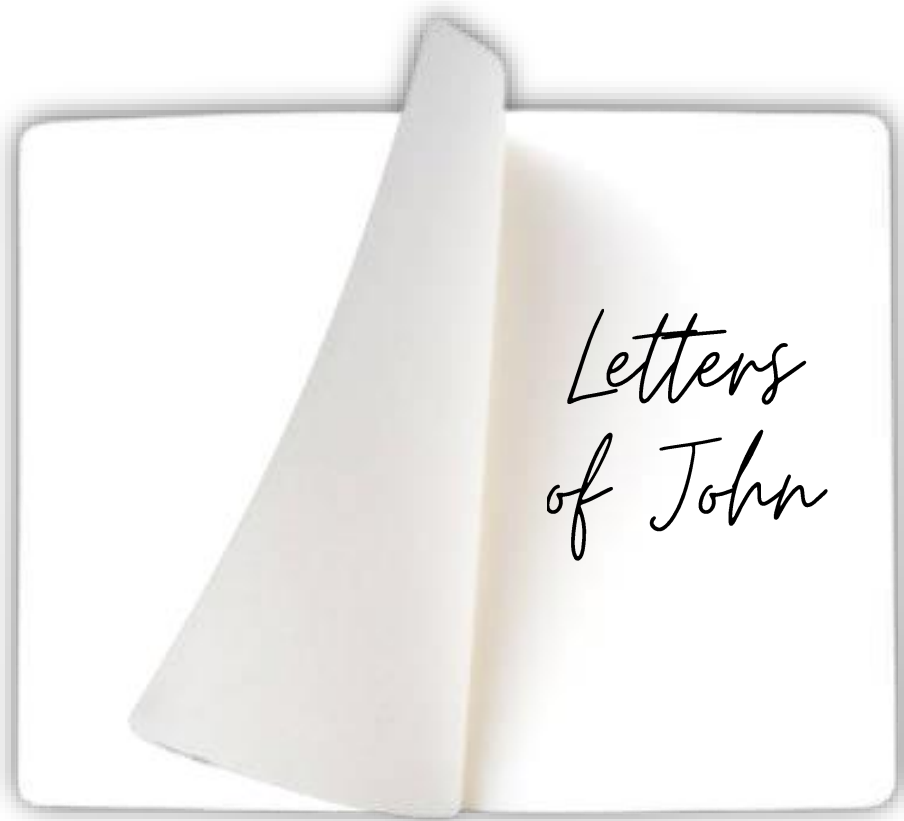
